One of the crucibles of the revolution that ended samurai rule in Japan, the city is home to five World Heritage sites that chronicle the birth of Japanese industrialization. Visitors love Hagi's beautiful historic neighborhoods, rustic clay walls, summer oranges, and traditional Hagi Yaki pottery.










# History

# ■ Hagi Castle Town

The Hagi Castle Town area, a registered UNESCO World Heritage Site, is a uniquely well-preserved example of a feudal Japanese city. Visitors enjoy walking through the old streets and seeing the old residences of wealthy



#### 2 Hagi Castle Ruins: Shizuki Park

Hagi Castle was constructed in 1604 by the Mōri lord. The main buildings were dismantled in the late 19th century, but the remaining moat and stone foundations reveal the old layout clearly.

#### 3 Hagi Uragami Museum

Fine art museum that displays ukiyoe prints such as Katsushika Hokusai, Asian ceramics, and Hagi Yaki Pottery. The building is designed by internationally admired Japanese architect Tange Kenzo, works of modern art are also exhibited.

#### 4 Aibagawa Waterway

Aibagawa Waterway is a narrow canal that flows through town, loved for its scenic views and colorful swimming koi fish. Visitors of the Yukawa Family Former Residence can get a glimpse of how old homes along the canal skillfully used river water for everyday life.

#### 5 Shōin Shrine

Shinto shrine dedicated to Yoshida Shōin, whose revolutionary ideas helped lead Japan to modernization at the end of the Edo period, and who trained the future leaders of Japan. Shokasonjuku Academy, a World Heritage Site, is located inside the grounds.

# **Temples**

#### 6 Tōkōji Temple

Temple of the Obaku Zen sect, founded in the 17th century based on Chinese Buddhist tradition. The elegant red main gate is just one example of many Chinese architectural influences. Hidden in the forest behind Tököji is the Möri lords cemetery, which holds the graves of all odd-numbered Hagi lords from the 3rd to 11th generation, their wives and children, and their subjects. Over 500 stone lanterns face the graves to create fantastic scenery that feels like a different, mysterious world. Tököji is a favorite location in autumn for blissful walks between the stone lanterns and brilliant red maple leaves.

#### **7** Daishōin Temple

Zen temple which honors the Mōri lords with Tōkōji. Behind the temple building is the Mōri clan cemetery, which holds the graves of all even-numbered Hagi lords from the 2nd to 12th generation, and their wives, surrounded by over 600 stone lanterns.

#### 8 Unrin-ji Temple

A temple on the outskirts of Hagi city. This temple is known for its deep connection with cats and various collection of cat-themed decorations. Cat lovers from around the world come to "Cat Temple" to show their appreciation.

# 9 Kikugahama Beach

Kikugahama is a beautiful sandy beach near the Hagi Castle ruins, where people can enjoy a perfect combination of soft white sand and summer sun. One of the best places to see the breath-taking sunsets of Hagi. Particularly in summer and autumn, Hagi's proximity to the sea often gives its sunsets a pink hue with dramatic cloud formations. Kikugahama beach and Hagi summer orange ice cream will be your favorite summer memory.

10 Mt. Kasayama

Striped cliffs formed by magma heat around 14 million years ago. Walking access to the bottom of the cliffs allows for a close-up view of the bold black and white stripes against the endless blue ocean.

This peninsula is home to a 112m high volcano. Visitors can see both the

the peak. The natural camellia grove at the base is full of beautiful flowers in




## **World Heritage Sites:**

# **Japan's Meiji Industrial Revolution**



Japan imported Western technology in the later half of the 19th century, followed by rapid breakthroughs in development which enabled Japan to establish itself as an industrial nation in the short span of 50 years. "Sites of Japan's Meiji Industrial Revolution" covers events from the 1850s until 1910, encompassing 23 sites across 8 prefectures and 11 cities, which demonstrate the progress of Japan's industrial development.



# Hagi is home to 5 heritage sites that highlight proto-industrial technology.



Built in 1856 as a prototype smelting furnace for casting Western-style iron cannons. The ruins remaining today include a 10.5m tall chimney.

# 13 Ebisugahana Shipyard

Built in the 1850s, this shipyard had pioneering role in the construction of Western-style warships. Two frigate sail ships were built here, and the original breakwater remains.

#### 14 Ohitayama Tatara Iron Works

Ironworks for the traditional Japanese tatara method of producing iron. In the Edo period, iron was made here from ironsand using charcoal.

#### 15 Hagi Castle Town

Authentic view of feudal Japan at the beginning of industrialization and modernization. The heritage area covers three zones: (1) The Castle Ruins, (2) the former Upper Class Samurai District, (3) the former Marchant Class District.

Horiuchi and Gofuku-machi, Hagi City etc.

### 16 Shokasonjuku Academy

Private school supervised by Yoshida Shōin in the late Edo period. Preaching the urgent importance of engineering studies, many students performed significant roles in the modernization of Japan.

Hagi Yaki Pottery

Hagi Yaki has over 400 years of history, since its beginnings in 1604. This simple pottery with soft texture has many charms, from its fine crazing and mottling, to the subtle variations in color and details. Hagi Yaki is porous and with use, tea will seep into the crazing of the glaze, gradually altering the color of the piece. Pottery fans love it for this phenomenon, know as the "seven disguises" of Hagi Yaki pottery. Recently, artistic display pieces and home use pieces are also being produced. Tourists can visit a climbing kiln or join a pottery class. Experience the tradition of Hagi Yaki.

#### 5 Joki Manju


Soft little cakes in the shape of steam ships, filled with anko (red bean paste).


#### 6 Local Sake & **Local Beer**

# How to get to Hagi





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Hagi City can be explored using the Hagi City Circular Hop-on Bus, rental bicycles or rental



Unlimited bus pass that covers all local bus routes, and some express buses, airport buses, and community PASS buses inside Yamaguchi prefecture for 1-3 days.

# Spring [Sakura] Late March - Early April

The Hagi castle ruins are surrounded by over 600 somei yoshino cherry trees, and an unusual white-blossomed midori yoshino tree that are only found in Hagi.

# 3 Autumn [Maple] All November

Red maple leaves can be enjoyed at Tōkōji and Daishōin, and a beautiful Japanese garden is specially opened in the castle town area.

# 2 Summer (Sunflower) Late July - Early August

Mutsumi Sunflower Road is a broad field of 220,000 sunflowers in the mountain valleys beyond downtown Hagi.

# 4 Winter [Camellia] Late January - Late March

Kasayama Camellia Grove is a natural forest of 25,000 trees. More than 60 types of elegant camellia bloom every winter.
