laruto Uzushio Whirlpools

"Uzushio" is a natural phenomenon that occurs when there is a violent tidal current in the Naruto Strait at the southern tip of Awaji Island, considered to be Japan's first island according to Japanese mythology. The diameter of the whirlpools can become up to 30 meters, making them one of the largest whirlpools in the world.

Takeda Castle Ruins A mountain castle was built at the peak of Mt. Kojo at an altitude of 353.7 meters. These stone wall ruins are one of Japan's major ruins that still completely remain. It is also called "Castle in the Sky" or "Machu Picchu of Japan" because it seems as if it is floating in the sea of clouds.

Denkansho-bushi (Traditional Folk Songs)


