Five-Story Pagoda * Built around 711

The Five-Story Pagoda boasts an elegance unmatched in Japan. Inside the first level. approximately 100 clay statues (national treasures) express the world of Buddhism. "Shakanyumetsu" (the death of the Buddha), which faces north, is particularly

was based on that of the center column of the Five-Story Pagoda.

Dajkodo Built in 990 (Great Lecture Hall)*

Horyuji Temple has long been a temple of learning, and the building at the center of that learning is the Daikodo. The Yakushi (Sakyamuni) triad (a national treasure) and the four heavenly quardians (an important cultural property) are enshrined at the center of the building.

Kondo (Main Hall)

the Kondo, three statues stand in a row: a seated statue of the Yakushi Nyorai (Bhaisaiyaguru a national treasure), the Shaka (Sakvamuni) triad (a national treasure) and the Amida(Amitabha) triad (an important cultural property). Visitors can also see the four heavenly quardians (a national treasure) that quard them, and above them a canopy (an important cultural property). With all this and Buddhist wall paintings on the surrounding walls, the Kondo offers a glimpse into the world of Buddhism.

Daihozoin Ruilt in 1998 (Gallery of Temple Treasures) Kudara Kannon Hall

Daihozoin is a treasure hall and visitors can see various treasures including the Kudara Kannon (a national treasure) in the center. In the rooms on the right and left are the Tamamushi Tabernacle(a national treasure), the Yumechigai Kannon (Dream-Changing Avalokitesvara statue, a national treasure), and the Lady Tachibana Tabernacle (a national treasure)

Shoryoin Built in 1284 (Hall of Prince Shotoku's Soul)

The southern end of the East Quarters was renovated into a hall to enshrine Prince Shotoku. A miniature shrine with a seated statue of Prince Shotoku (a national treasure) is opened during the temple memorial service for Prince

Toin Garan (Eastern Precinct) and Yumedono (Hall of Visions);

The Kuse Kannon (Avalokitesvara the Savior, a national treasure) is enshrined in Hakkakuendo, which was built on the former site of Prince Shotoku's Ikaruga Palace. The Kuse Kannon is a Buddhist. image with the body proportions of Prince Shotoku that is normally withheld from public view.

Built around 711 This is one of the oldest wooden (Central Gate) (an important cultural property) stand

The cloister gallery (a national treasure from the Nara period), the Kyozo (sutra repository, a national treasure from the Nara period) and the bell house (a national treasure from the Heian period) are positioned so as to enclose the center of the Saiin Garan (Western Precinct).



Nandaimon (South Main Gate)

The front gate of Horyuji Temple. The grounds seen through the gate look like a framed picture.



Hokiji Temple is said to have gotten its starts when Prince Yamashiro, based on the will of Prince Shotoku, altered Okamoto Palace, where the Prince Shotoku lectured about the Lotus Sutra, into a temple, It has Japan's oldest extant three-story pagoda, which is a national treasure and one of the three towers of Ikaruga. Along with Horyuji Temple, it is registered as a World Heritage Site.

Horinji Temple

Prince Yamashiro is said to have built this temple in the first half of the 7th century with a wish for his father. Prince Shotoku, to recover from illness. It has three-story pagoda that is one of the three towers of Ikaruga.
