Lake Tazawa, Kakunodate, Oga Peninsula and Akita City are all included in Akita Prefecture. This district is blessed with natural wonders which have been left undisturbed until now. Abundant Onsen (hot springs) is the blessings of nature in the area, forming relaxing hot spring spas here and there. You may experience real country life with the locals while bathing at most of hot spring spots. Akita City, the prefectural capital, is known as the host city of Akita Kanto Festival in early August

(see p.4).

The surrounding areas are known for their quality rice production and forests of Akita Cedar.

It is good to know that bus schedule changes with a plenty of seasonal features, such as cherry blossoms in Spring, passionate festivals in Summer, beautiful leaves in Autumn and good snow in Winter. Tourist Information Centers will assist you to make your itinerary.

KAKUNODATE AND LAKE TAZAWA

Kakunodate (角館)

A castletown founded by the local Lord Ashina in 1620, is a small, charming town now called "Little Kyoto of Tohoku." The town, just the right size to be explored on foot, preserves many 390-year-old samurai houses. Rental bicycles are available in the warmer seasons.

- ①The House of Aoyagi (青柳家), 15 min. walk from Kakunodate Sta., is a well-cared-for samurai house. Its gate, built in 1860, is designated as an Important Cultural Property. A rare species of weeping cherry tree is also in the garden. Open: 9:00–17:00, –16:00 (Nov.–Mar.) Admission: ¥500 Other samurai houses those of the Ishiguro, Iwahashi, Matsumoto and Odano families are also open to the public.
- ②Arcade of Cherry Trees (檜木内川桜のトンネル), 15 min. walk from the Kakunodate Sta. along the Hinokinai River flowing through the town, is considered one of the best cherry

blossom viewing spots in the district in late Apr.

- ③Weeping Cherry Trees (枝垂桜), combined with old samurai houses, are a symbol of the town. Of more than 450 weeping cherry trees which are descendants of the trees transplanted from Kyoto about 350 years ago, 162 are designated as Natural Monuments.
- ④The Denshokan Hall (伝承館), situated in front of samurai houses, serves as a museum and training center for cherry bark handicrafts. Visitors can see how handicrafts are made. Open: 9:00–17:00 (Apr.–Nov. enter by 16:30), –16:00 (Dec.–Mar. enter by 15:30) Admission: ¥300.
- ⑤Storehouse of the Ando family (安藤家の蔵), 15 min. walk from the station, is a merchant storehouse built of brick in 1891

LAKE TAZAWA (田沢湖)

The deepest lake in Japan (423.4 m), whose water is the second most transparent after Lake Mashu in Hokkaido, is said to have been formed by a caldera eruption. The golden Statue of Tatsuko, a symbol of the lake with a mystic atmosphere, stands on the western shore, 20 min. by bus from Tazawakohan Bus Stop.

Sightseeing Around the Lake:

By sightseeing boat: A 40 min. tour boat that takes you from Shirahama to view the Statue of Tatsuko and Gozanoishi Shrine. 4 services a day. Operated: late Apr. — early Nov. Fare: ¥1,220.

By bus: Regular bus service takes you around the lake from Tazawako Sta. (¥1,210) and from Tazawakohan bus stop (¥830). 3 services in a day.


By bicycle: Bicycle rentals are available near Tazawa-kohan bus stop. Fare: ¥500 per hour (varies by types of bicycles; Open between late Apr. and late Oct.)

Tazawako Kogen (Plateau) Onsen-kyo (田沢湖高原温泉郷), is located to the northeast of Lake Tazawa, 30 min. by bus from Tazawako Sta. bound for Nyuto Onsen Village. Along with the neighboring Mizusawa Onsen Village, it offers a spectacular view of the entire Lake Tazawa, while accommodating hikers and skiers all around the seasons.

Nyuto Onsen-kyo (乳頭温泉郷), is an area with 7 unspoiled hot spring inns, all of which feature independent headsprings with different healing properties.

Yumeguri Map (湯めぐりマップ) is available for 600 yen and provides access to all ryokan in Nyuto Area. Valid for the day of issue only. (can be purchased even on a day trip).

Yumeguri-cho (湯めぐり帖, Yumeguri pass) is available for 1,800 yen and includes rides and admission to all seven hot spring

Mt. Akita Komagatake (秋田駒ヶ岳), is a collective name for 3 mountain peaks—Odake, Medake, and Onamedake—whose highest altituede is of Onamedake (1,637 m). Akita Komagatake Alpine Zone (above 1,300 m) is where a rich variety of alpine plants are observed and designated as the special natural monument. A 60 min. bus ride from Tazawako Sta. is available to 8th Sta. trailhead (¥1,050; Jun.—Oct.), from which the summit area is within 90 min. hike.


AKITA CITY

Akita City (秋田市)

The prefectural capital with a population of 306,178 (Oct. 2019), once thrived as a castletown under the reign of the Satake family during the Edo Period. It is now the cultural and industrial center of the northern Tohoku District with fine museums, wooden-ware industry and productive oil fields.

- ①Senshu Park (千秋公園), 10 min. walk from Akita Sta., marks the site of the now-ruined Kubota Castle of the Satake family. Noted for the beauty of cherry blossoms and azaleas in season, the park is a favorite relaxing spot for the local people. Cultural facilities such as the municipal library and the prefectural public hall (scheduled to reopen in 2022) are located in the park.
- ②Akita Museum of Art (秋田県立美術館), 10 min. walk from Akita Sta. The main feature of the collection is "The Events of Akita" by Tsuguharu Fujita (Léonard Foujita): a mural measuring

- more than 20 meters wide that depicts various traditional events in Akita. Also, the building with spacious view commanding Senshu Park was designed by Tadao Ando. Open: 10:00–18:00 Admission: ¥310. (subject to change during special exhibitions)
- **Atorion** (アトリオン), 5 min. walk from Akita Sta., is a good place to see and buy the specialties and folk crafts of Akita Prefecture. Open: 9:30–22:00.
- ④Kawabata Street (川反通り), 15 min. walk from Akita Sta., is the most lively and bustling quarter in Akita Prefecture. More than 500 pubs, bars and restaurants crowd the street where you can enjoy drinking local brand Sake and eating local specialties such as a hot pot cooked with Shottsuru (fish sauce made from sand fish) or dishes cooked with Kiritampo (a rice stick).

OGA PENINSULA

Oga Quasi-National Park (男鹿国定公園)

Oga Peninsula, jutting about 20 km into the Japan Sea, just west of the Hachirogata Lagoon, is blessed with outstanding natural beauty—forests of Akita Cedar, grassy green hills and a varied coastline. Three pleasant roads run along the peninsula. Since regular bus service is not frequent and operated only during the summer, a sightseeing bus may be the most convenient and easiest way of getting to the tourist sites.



Mt. Kampu (寒風山), alt. 355 m on the foot of the peninsula, is an elegant-looking mountain covered all over with a grassy lawn, devoid of trees. The observatory on the top commands a splendid four directional view.

Nishi Kaigan or West Coast (西海岸), indicating the coast from Monzen to Toga Bay, is a highlight of the Oga tour. The rugged scenery and dynamic beauty of the coast and its rock formations can be best enjoyed by taking a sightseeing boat operated between Monzen and Oga Aquarium. Driving along the coast is also exciting.

Oga Aquarium GAO (男鹿水族館), the biggest aquarium in northern Japan, contains more than 400 species of fish and aquatic animals. Admission: ¥1,100.

Oga Onsen (男鹿温泉), on the north coast of the peninsula, serves as a base for peninsula sightseeing, offering a rich choice of overnight accommodations.

Cape Nyudozaki (入道崎), at the northwestern tip, has a gently sloping plateau covered with green lawn which falls 30 m sheer into the sea. The black and white striped lighthouse is a symbol of the cape.

Hachibodai (八望台), 15 min. by bus from Cape Nyudozaki, is a grassy plateau from which you can enjoy a marvelous view of the underlying lakes and the bay. Especially at twilight, the panoramic view will fascinate visitors.

Hachirogata Lagoon (八郎潟干拓地), once the second largest lake in Japan, has been reclaimed and is now a vast farm land of 172 km². Highly mechanized modern agriculture in progress can be observed here. Ogatamura Village, newly constructed settlement, can be reached in 1 hr. 30 min. from Akita City or 30 min. from Hachirogata Sta. by taxi.

Annual Events:

Kanto Festival (竿燈まつり), held in Akita City on Aug. 3–6 is one of the three grand festivals of Tohoku. A "kanto" is a long bamboo pole with several horizontal "ribs," from which swing many paper lanterns. Festival clad performers parade in the city, trying their skill at balancing "kanto" on their palms, foreheads, shoulders or hips.

Namahage is a unique annual event observed in various places on Oga Peninsula on New Year's Eve. At night, groups of young men disguised as ogres wearing angry devil's masks called "Namahage" visit each house where there are children of the village, roaming and shouting "Any good-for-nothing fellows around here?" Namahages are welcome to the house by the owner and treated to rice cakes and sake on leaving.


